SNAC Stats

As of reporting time (April 24, 2020), there were 3,737,173 constellations and 2,089,038 resource descriptions in SNAC. There were 260 edits in the last week of April, and our most active editor currently was Kit Messick at the Getty Research Institute.

In the past month SNAC had over 48,000 users and referred over 4,300 visitors to holding institutions sites.

Developer's Update: Joseph Glass, Lead Developer (<u>jhq2v@virginia.edu</u>)

The OpenRefine Capstone Team have finished their last semester of work on the SNAC OpenRefine Extension. It currently supports Resource Description insertion and editing, and a basic version of Constellation insertion. SNAC developers will pick up the project and continue building out support for more comprehensive Constellation and relationship support, as well as an improved user interface. A <u>draft users manual</u> including installation instructions is open for comments.

SNACSchool and the NARA Liaisons Team:

In response to increased need for telework friendly projects during the COVID-19 quarantines, the SNACSchool Team hosted two training events aimed at equipping new SNAC editors to work from home. On April 7th, the Team trained 37 editors. Among this group were large contingencies from the Getty Research Institute, NYU Archives and the Folger Shakespeare Library. On April 15, Jerry Simmons and Dina Herbert hosted an abbreviated, NARA-focused SNACSchool for 17 staff representing the agency's satellite facilities and presidential libraries.

The next SNACSchool will be another NARA-focused event on May 20, and will again be geared to integrating more NARA staff into online-based projects while NARA facilities are closed for the COVID-19 pandemic. As with the previous two "all-NARA" SNACSchools, linking SNAC records to NARA online catalog description resources will be the emphasis.

The SNACSchool Team met on April 8th to discuss and plan for training events until the end of 2020. Due to a number of changes by professional conference organizers, SNACSchool events for the duration of 2020 will be entirely remote unless otherwise specified. Though an official list of training dates is anticipated in the coming weeks, there is a confirmed, full SNACSchool event set for Wednesday, June 24. Please contact <u>Dina Herbert</u> to register.

Finally, in cooperation with Harvard Law Library (Irene Gates) and Peabody Museum (Katherine Satriano) partners, the NARA SNAC Liaisons Team hosted the very first SNAC Editathon April 23-25. The editathon was the culmination of planning by a new consortium of archivists, librarians and museum professionals who share interest in the description and discovery of cultural heritage materials by and about archaeologists, anthropologists, and curators who

studied indigenous peoples of the Americas. The event was co-hosted via GoToMeeting where participant editors could chat and ask questions. Statistical data covering the event is forthcoming.
